

### Winslow

Waterfront Trail - In Winslow, a network of trails, parks, and roads connect the community to the waterfront and the ferry terminal. Paved paths exist between the Ferry Terminal and Waterfront Park. A maritime boardwalk begins at the southern end of Madison Avenue. Work is ongoing to acquire and complete missing links in the Waterfront Trail system.

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### Fort Ward & Blakely Harbor

Fort Ward State Park - There is a level paved road along the water for about 0.9 miles on which motorized traffic is prohibited. At this time parking at the main entrance on the west side is on gravel, but a path around the motor vehicle gate is being widened to make access using wheelchairs and walkers easier. One camp site is available for water trail use. A new trail connecting Fort Ward State Park with Blakely Harbor was completed in 2007.



### Partners

This map of trails and the greenways through which they pass is a project of the City's Non-Motorized Transportation Advisory Committee guided by the City's Non-Motorized Transportation Plan and in collaboration with many partners over many years. As our community improves our active transportation facilities, new groups and initiatives are growing our greenway network both on and off-road.





### Grand Forest & Battle Point Park

There is an approximately 1.25 mile trail around the perimeter of Battle Point Park which is completely level. This path is made of fine crushed and packed rock, and works well for people using mobility devices such as walkers and wheelchairs. A side trail around the north pond is paved, but has sections thrust by tree roots. Parking at the east entrance is asphalt, the west and north parking areas are gravel. Completion of the new Forest to Sky Trail connecting the Grand Forest to Battle Point Park is anticipated in 2007.

### Shore to Shore

The Shore to Shore Trail was made possible by the joint effort of the Bainbridge Island Land Trust, Bainbridge Island Metro Parks & Recreation District and the City of Bainbridge Island Open Space Commission working with private property owners to acquire the land. The 3.5 mile trail winds through 441 acres, the largest area of contiguous open space on Bainbridge Island. Beginning at the public beach of Schel-Celb Estuary near Lynwood Center, the trail crosses Baker Hill Road, traverses the Peter's Property, connects with the Gazzam Lake trail and continues through the Close Property to the beach on Port Orchard Bay. The trail officially opened in September 2005. The Bainbridge Island Metro Parks & Recreation District collaborated on trail design and construction, and now maintains the entire length of the trail.

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
